Read John 20:11-16 in your Bible

John 20:17-22, 29 ESV - 17 Jesus said to her, "Do not cling to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father; but go to my brothers and say to them, I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." 18 Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"--and that he had said these things to her. 19 On the evening of that day, the first day of the week, the doors being locked where the disciples were for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." 20 When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord. 21 Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you." 22 And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ... 29 Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Easter 2018

INTRODUCTION

At Easter we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. But before there was a resurrection there was a crucifixion. His followers had been told Jesus would rise from the dead, but in the face of his death and burial they encountered the worst thing that could have possibly happened. The one who offered them hope was gone and now they were in despair. The Bible tells us that when Jesus rose to life their hope was restored, but why is that important to us today? Let's consider how Jesus' resurrection can restore our hope as well.

STUDY QUESTIONS (45 MIN)

Historical and Evidential Truth

Q1. Read Isaiah 59:20; John 4:25; Matthew 11:2-5 God had promised His people through the prophets of the Old Testament that He would send a Savior (Isaiah 59:20). When Jesus appeared on the scene the Jews were already watching for their Messiah to come. (John 4:25) From his prison cell John the Baptist sent a message to Jesus asking if He was the one they were waiting for (Matthew 11:2-5). What did Jesus point them to in answer to that question? The important truth of who Jesus is can be seen both in historical fact and impactful evidence. When you think of someone whose life was changed by following Jesus what kind of evidence would you point to in their life?

Hopes of the People

Q2. Read Isaiah 9:6-7; 40:10-11; Jeremiah 23:5-6; Matthew 11:5 The promise of a Messiah offered God's people great hope. What were some of the things they expected the Messiah to do? After generations of oppression Jesus appeared to offer the promised relief they sought. What works had they already witnessed Jesus doing (Matthew 11:5)?

Hopes Dashed

Q3. Read Genesis 1:2; John 20:11-16

Contrary to what the people might have expected Jesus did not lead a rebellion or overthrow the oppression of Rome. Instead He submitted to God's will and offered himself to be brutally crucified as a sacrifice for the sins of mankind. And when He died, the hopes of his followers died as well.

A life without hope is not unlike the condition of the earth in Genesis 1:2; shapeless, filled with darkness and without direction. But just as God spoke and brought light into the world, He has the ability to breathe light back into a hopeless life. How was Mary Magdalene's hope restored? (John 20:11-16)

Resurrection and Restoration of Hope

Q4. Read John 20:15

Jesus' question to Mary was "Why are you crying?" Her response was that they had taken away her Lord, and in so doing they stripped her of all hope. Have you ever experienced placing your hope in something that died (job, person, relationship...)? Has the appearance of Jesus in your life restored your hope in that situation? Ask your group to pray that God would touch any circumstances that have caused you to lose hope and ask God to bring restoration.

THE BOTTOM LINE

We know both historically and through the evidence of changed lives that Jesus lives, and the power that raised Him from the dead is at work in us. We do not have to remain hopeless, even in the face of loss. Because Jesus has ascended to the Father and intercedes for us there, we now have access to the throne of God, where we find forgiveness and eternal life. When we allow Jesus into our hopeless situations He can restore us and bring new hope, because the worst thing we face doesn't have to be the last thing in our lives.

PUTTING IT INTO PRACTICE

Even after Easter, the news of the resurrection needs to be shared. Find someone this week who might feel hopeless, perhaps experiencing a loss, and share with them the comfort and the good news that Jesus can restore hope and bring light in their darkness.
