PEACE I LEAVE WITH YOU; MY PEACE I GIVE YOU. I DO NOT GIVE TO YOU AS THE WORLD GIVES. DO NOT LET YOUR HEARTS BE TROUBLED AND DO NOT BE AFRAID.

Peace. Something our world is desperate for. However, peace is usually defined by the world as simply the temporary absence of open conflict... and usually worldly peace only comes through violence, fear, and the conquest of one over another. That doesn't really sound like peace, does it? Thank God (literally) that Jesus doesn't give peace like the world does.

The world's type of peace does nothing to address the chaos, anger, and division bubbling up, just under the surface. It does nothing to address the anxiety and turmoil felt within our own souls. The world can

only imagine peace that is rooted in fear and threat. On the cross, Jesus took on the sin and violence of humankind and responded not with threat but with love and grace. In this way, Jesus offered peace with God and with one another, not through more threat but through reconciliation and forgiveness. This is the peace - the true peace- we celebrate during Advent. This is why we celebrate the Child born - the Prince of Peace.

Thank you for bringing a different type of peace to the world...the only peace that can truly reconcile. Help me to quiet my soul and welcome your peace into my heart this Advent

season.

Much like peace, joy is something unlike anything the world has to offer. Many times we use the word "happiness" interchangeably with "joy". However, happiness is a temporary emotion based on our circumstances. Joy is not an emotion but rather an assurance that comes from experiencing and trusting in God. Like the divine presence itself, there is no formula for

having or experiencing joy. Joy cannot be controlled, possessed, or held onto with a firm grip. Joy is not

the byproduct of having security and living withoutrisk. Ratherjoy-like God's presence - can only be received with gratitude as one perceives the work of God, even, if not often, in difficult circumstances. We can dance in and receive in openness the joy of the Lord, but we can't constrain it. As C.S. Lewis puts it, "I doubt whether anyone who has tasted it [joy] would ever exchange it for all the pleasures in the world. But then joy is never in our power and pleasure often is."

I want to experience your joy! I'm tired of settling for temporary moments of happiness that don't ultimately satisfy. Help me to taste and see your goodness and live in gratitude for it.
